

Washington National Opera: Carmen

Bold, rebellious, mercurial –that's the provocative gypsy Carmen. And to dutiful soldier Don José, she's too much to handle... yet maddeningly irresistible. In a moment of unbridled passion, Don José ultimately surrenders to her seductive charms, forcing him to flee his village and abandon his childhood sweetheart for an outlaw's life in the mountains. But once Carmen scorns his affections for a dashing matador, her fiery act of betrayal ignites a jealous rage, leading to shocking, murderous consequences.

This sizzling production of Bizet's most famous opera shifts the classic story to a Latin American setting smoldering with sensuality and danger, using the original version of the score. The music pulses with erotic power –from Carmen's rousing *Habanera* aria and uninhibited dancing in a smoky tavern to the famous *Toreador Song*– all culminating in a spectacular finale at a bullfight.

Free opera insights:

Musicologist Saul Lilienstein leads the Thursday, Sep. 24 Opera Insight, starting 1 hour and 15 minutes before the performance and lasting 35–40 minutes.
